This session will address the overarching question: What is the role of the treaty body system in fostering human rights compliance? What best practices exist among treaty bodies for ensuring they meet their objectives? Are there lessons to be learned from the Inter-American system regarding ways to improve the functioning of the treaty bodies?

This session will address the ways in which treaty bodies can enhance state engagement to foster greater human rights compliance and accountability. What practices can improve the timeliness and quality of state reporting; what methods and modalities contribute to constructive dialogue with states, as well as ongoing monitoring of compliance with recommendations that arise during periodic reviews of state human rights records, as well as individual cases.

10:45-12:15 The Role of Technology in Enhancing Human Rights Monitoring and Implementation

This session will focus upon the importance of technology in the work of the treaty bodies and the ability of treaty to engage with stakeholders to improve accessibility and information sharing. Specifically: How can technology enhance the roles, impact, and working methods of treaty bodies? How can it enhance accessibility for states, NGOs, and other stakeholders? How should information/data regarding concluding observations, rulings on individual complaints, and associated contributions from member states and other stakeholders be organized and searched so as to optimize the accessibility and impact of treaty bodies?; and How can technology advance working relationships among and between the UN human rights mechanisms and the Inter-American system? What information can and should be shared publicly? What constraints exist in this regard, and how can they be overcome?
